Burning Hearts and Opening Eyes

How was it that the two disciples along the road from walking Jerusalem to couldn't Emmaus recognize Jesus? Hadn't they grown accustomed to his face or become familiar with his voice? Jesus had been with them for almost three years and surely, they would have seen him in person, watched him in action and heard him in his teaching. Perhaps the risen Jesus appeared entirely different from the Jesus of Nazareth. Whatever the reason may be, we are told that as they walked along, they were wrapped up in their own grief and loss. They were focused on themselves. Their faces were down cast and their hearts were cold.

Jesus appears to them and asks them, What matters are you discussing as you walk along? Then he listens to them tell their story. He hears of their crushed hopes and shattered dreams. He pays attention to their fear and pain. When they had finished pouring out their hearts, Jesus takes over and tells them the story of God's saving plan. He explains to them the meaning of the Scriptures till their empty hearts begin to burn within them once again with renewed hope and excitement. They do not want this dialogue to end. So, they invite him to stay with them.

Jesus accepts their invitation and he sits with them at table. He takes, blesses, breaks and gives bread to them. All of a sudden, their eyes are opened and they recognize his presence. This is the very intention of

the risen Jesus in all his appearances to the disciples - to open their eyes, to see his presence and recognize him in faith. The moment this happens, their lives are transformed. They take the road back to Jerusalem to tell the others the good news of their new experience with Jesus.

This Jerusalem-Emmaus story is our story as well. We ought to be able to see ourselves in the two disciples on our own camino in life and faith. Often. we tend to walk away from the very places and people who can help us. support us, challenge us and change us for the better. We allow our hearts to become cold with past pains. We close our eyes to the 'present' (the gift) that's right before and beside us. We invite you all to join us, the Redemptorists, as we embark on our iourney and strive to be *Missionaries of* Hope in the Footsteps of the Redeemer. Let us have better conversations as we walk alongside others listening to them first and then sharing with them the Good News of plentiful redemption in Jesus Christ. Let us grow stronger in communion with one another as we invite the Lord to stay with us and sit with us at our table. May his words continue to burn in our hearts offering us fresh hope every day as we live in a very wounded world. May his presence in the Eucharist open our eyes to the newness of life we receive from him as we remember and celebrate his life. death and resurrection.

There will be a second collection on 30th April for the ongoing formation of the diocesan seminarians and expenses relating to the St. Francis Xavier Major Seminary.




Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults
