'Gird your loins, light your lamps?'

This Sunday's readings point to faith and the faithful being ready for God's call. Both Abraham (in the second reading from Hebrews 11) and the faithful and prudent steward (in the gospel reading from Luke 12) knew the heart of God. In faith. Abraham had obeved God's orders and journeyed to a foreign land and in his old age had his offspring Isaac. When put to the test to sacrifice Isaac, he did not flinch and subsequently got back his son. God kept His promise and gave Abraham generations as many as the stars in the sky. The faithful steward in the second reading was alert and made sure he was ready for his master's return anvtime.

Will we be ready when God calls or are we like the other servant who takes advantage of the master's delay to commit misdeeds - getting drunk and beating up other servants?

Do we live by the world's standard of "each to his own" or do we live by the word of God, ie doing the right thing, to be ready anytime when the Lord calls?

We can sometimes be schizophrenic. behaving differently in different contexts. I know that some people holding positions of authority may be difficult to their subordinates, sometimes being rude and unkind.

At home, they dote on their children. How would their Master treat them when He calls them home? Would be be like the master in the parable and give them a severe beating, because they should have known better?

How do we know who did the wronadoing with full knowledge or with ignorance? We may not be able to discern but God knows. God is everything and in everything, so never underestimate God.

So how do we "gird our loins and light our lamps"? We need to take responsibility of the situation at hand. Whatever we do must not distract us from our end goal, ie to live with God. Beina sensitive to movements of the Holy Spirit - He may advise to take another path to stay safe: Stay humble - acknowledge that our gifts and talents are from God: and •Make the word of God alive actively read, pray and apply

If the master finds us vigilant, He would be the one to gird his loin to serve his faithful servants. Jesus had introduced to us the concept of servant leadership and we do not need to read management books to understand this idea of leading by example.

The key takeaway is to "Be Ready" always.
