Today we celebrate the Annual Novena Procession and it is particularly significant because it is the 75th Anniversary of Novena Church. The theme chosen for the celebration reflects God's constant faithfulness and Mary's intercession both in the past and into the future. It expresses our gratitude for all we have received and the hope that we have in God's plentiful redemption.

Gratitude - In 1949, the novena began with just a handful of people in the house chapel. Very soon, a church had to be built and within a couple of decades, the novena attracted thousands of devotees every Saturday. We are most grateful for how Mary our Mother, has through the novena, drawn thousands of people to the Catholic faith and helped countless people of all faiths experience the plentiful redemption that her Son Jesus offers.

Hope - At our last General Chapter. Redemptorists around the world, were urged to be missionaries of hope and the Jubilee Year reminds us that we are pilgrims walking with hope. The Gospel tells us the story of Jesus' birth and it is a reminder that even though our world is so wounded, there is always hope because God is truly present, especially in places where woundedness abounds. Jesus is Emmanuel, God-is-with-us. God is with us throughout our pilgrimage of life, through both happy and challenging moments.

Remember - Our Christian faith places a great emphasis on memory. Every time we celebrate the Eucharist and when we celebrate the Annual Procession, we remember the blessings that we have received from God. They are signs of God's faithfulness and presence in our lives, the fruits of Marv's intercession.

Rejoice - This memory of God's blessings leads us to two things. First, it leads us to rejoice. People participate at the Procession with such passion and enthusiasm. Anniversaries, especially milestone anniversaries, are days to celebrate God's faithfulness blessings.

Renew - The memory of God's blessings also leads us to share those blessings with others. This week our Superior-General Fr. Rogerio Gomes and onehundred Redemptorists and our lav partners have gathered to renew our charism to preach the Good News to the most abandoned. The prophet Micah referred to this group as the remnant. the anawim, for whom God has special care and who Redemptorists give special attention to in their apostolate. This anniversary must push us to renew this commitment. At the same time, the anawim are themselves missionaries of hope to us. Paul tells the Romans. 'for those who love God, all things work together unto good.' Our devotion to Our Mother of Perpetual Help is a reminder that with God there is always hope, mercy and plentiful redemption that all shall be well.
