



Faith: The Great Adventure

In his Apostolic Exhortation *Christus Vivit*, Pope Francis spoke of how we need to show young people that following Jesus is a great adventure. Too often, he said, faith is only put across as a list of doctrines that must be believed under pain of heresy and a collection of moral norms that must be observed under pain of sin.

Yet, that was not the message that Jesus preached. As we have begun Ordinary Time, we read and reflect on the Sermon on the Mount from the Gospel of Matthew. The Sermon on the Mount is one of Jesus' most powerful and beloved teachings. It includes the Our Father, the mission of disciples to be the salt of the earth and light of the world, the teaching on the real meaning of rules and laws and today, the Beatitudes. Jesus does not offer us rigid laws and rules. Instead, he offers us a vision of life, a "great adventure." Jesus offers us an invitation to live our lives in a way that cooperates with God in bringing about the renewal of humanity and creation.

In last week's Gospel, Jesus began his ministry by calling for repentance, proclaiming that the Kingdom is at hand and healing the sick. And now, Jesus gathers the people and preaches the Sermon on the Mount. The poor, the hungry, the victims of injustice, those who mourn; are even more loved by God, Jesus assures them of God's presence and comfort. More than that, these are the people that God has chosen to be the instruments of God's Kingdom. How?

First, those who are poor in spirit, the humble and those who suffer injustice, will be instruments of the Kingdom because they are the ones who need it most. Because of that, they place their faith and trust in what God will accomplish. Jesus assures them that God will take away their pain and bring joy into their lives again. Jesus is saying to them: "God loves you, you are blessed by God."

Secondly, the Kingdom of God will be brought about by those who are adventurous enough to embrace Jesus' vision of life, who choose to live Jesus and who form themselves according to his image. They try to be pure, they show mercy to others, they are instruments of peace and are willing to face persecution when they do what is right.

Only God can bring about the Kingdom, but Jesus calls his disciples to be co-builders of that Kingdom together with God. How? By living the teachings of Jesus, by having the mind of God, by acting the way that God does. Now isn't that a great adventure?
